

Food Apartheid in DC


Food Deserts Are Result Of Systemic Racism

- Systems, Policies, and Institutions That Create Socio-Economic Disadvantages For Black People
- Prevents Wealth Building Tools



Half of D.C. food deserts are in Ward 8

Areas with limited food access in the District (based on grocery or supermarket proximity, household income, and car access), by ward

Data: Interview with 34 current and prospective growers in DC

- Land access and tenure as the key challenge for the growers
 - → Mixed outcome of the current policy


 - Urban Farm Land Lease program (No success)
 Urban Farm Tax Abatement (Not fully utilized)
- Bureaucratic inconsistencies/confusion across DC agencies
 - → Needs to recognize diverse "urban agriculture" practices
- Equitable/Transparent financial resources access
 - → New USDA funding for urban agriculture
